Reopening our income-generating departments has enabled a stronger financial result this year. CEO'S REPORT

After a tumultuous couple of years, getting a line of sight on what business as usual now looks like is challenging. Our usually reliable animal statistics and financial data are skewed because of lockdowns and business interruptions.

We had been seeing a drop in the number of animals coming to our shelters, and the length of stay was down; unfortunately, this was a Covid anomaly. As our community returns to some form of normality, we are seeing a significant increase in lost and abandoned animals, compounded by a decrease in adoption interest. Capacity is the biggest challenge a shelter faces. As I write this report, we are full.

The types of dogs we are taking into our care are far more challenging now than they were five years ago. Many dogs needing our love and support are large breeds requiring socialisation and training. To assist us in getting these dogs adoption ready, we have employed a Canine Behaviorist whose role is to undertake behavioural assessments and set up training plans for our staff and volunteers to deliver.

We look forward to the positive outcomes this appointment will create.

I am very proud of our cattery teams and veterinary staff, who have lifted our feline save rates to 85%, a remarkable achievement and well above shelter norms. This has been attained through initiatives including extending our foster care placements, enhanced neonatal care and improved veterinary methods. Led by Dr Nico Maritz and a highly competent veterinary team, we can undertake complex surgeries and deliver the best care to animals in need.



We are constantly seeking ways to reduce intake, increase adoptions and minimise the length of stay.

Animal Aid's success would not be possible without our animal services enterprises. Our Boarding department accelerated post-Covid, and occupancy rates are at their height. Grooming is always busy, and our dog training classes are very popular. Our clinic is so well regarded it is difficult to keep up with private work demand.

Our four opportunity shops are great small enterprises. Solely operated by a dedicated team of volunteers, these shops generate mission-critical funds. We are thankful to everyone who gives their time and to the community that donates quality goods.

Beyond the income generated via our animal service businesses and op shops, we still need to raise significant funds through donations, appeals, monthly giving, and events to deliver our animal welfare work. Our small but mighty fundraising team punches above their weight, and our community supports us generously.

Our shelters continue to evolve. Animal Aid East Gippsland opened their new outdoor cat play space in December. Stockyards and a pavilion have been constructed in the Coldstream wetlands, and our new Shelter Kennels are rapidly advancing. It is heartening to know our dogs will be far more comfortable



during the hotter and colder months of the year. This is all made possible by our community, who support us through donations, events, using our services and leaving a gift in their will.

Thank you to our army of volunteers. Not having you during lockdowns has made us appreciate your importance and support even more. You are priceless.

Over the past year, our Board has grown to 9. We have excellent and diverse skill sets that underpin our mission to deliver exceptional animal care. I thank you for giving your time and advice. To our Chairman Glenda Walker, you are a great boss, an appreciated donor and a valued friend.

Caring for so many animals is challenging. While puppy cuddles and cat smooches are a fun part of the job, the work is physically and mentally demanding. Our 80+ team of animal professionals are true heroes and make every day count.

Leadership is an action, not a title. Our management team is knowledgeable and dedicated, and they lead by example. Thank you for your partnership and advocacy for animals.

Next year is our 75th anniversary. We have saved the lives of countless animals over that time. I look forward to celebrating those achievements with our people and community.








REDEVELOPMENT UPDATE

In March, we demolished our Shelter Kennels and Kennels Reception to make way for new buildings. Temporary shelter housing has been taken up in a segregated part of the boarding facility, with Reception temporarily located in our old veterinary clinic.

Our previous builds, including Boarding, Shelter Cattery and the Clinic, all ran to expected time frames and budget. The Kennels construction has been somewhat challenging with industry trade shortages impacting materials costs and availability. We will open 58 new kennels by Christmas, three months later than anticipated. The Kennels Reception and first-floor administration will be completed around April 2023.

Also contributing to cost and delays, Melbourne Water imposed new height conditions on our buildings due to flood overlays. This required us to amend all architectural drawings and engineering specifications to lift the floor level above ground to 2M in height.

The additional cost is impacting, but on the positive, the elevation makes for an interesting footprint. Dogs will now be able to see unincumbered from their kennels, as barriers are not needed to screen out other dog movements to pathways and run yards. Additionally, the blockwork forms walls for the run yards and provides extra security. The layout is linked by elevated walkways that enhance the environment and give aspect to our grounds and wetlands.



Post completion of the kennels, Reception, and administration, we plan to commence building the kennels services hub. This space has 16 indoor kennels, including isolation pens, a laundry, a salon, an animal kitchen, office, storeroom and a breakout room. Incoming dogs will be housed in triage pens and the elevated underfloor space used for bulk storage and workshop. We hope to have this building completed in late 2023.

The last stages of redevelopment will see:

- The older parts of our boarding facilities rebuilt with a range of dog accommodation options and play spaces.
- New adoption kennels.
- A multipurpose room.



SHELTER KENNELS

2022 has been a year of change.

The start of the year saw our Kennels redevelopment finally getting off the ground. This was exciting but also brought unique challenges.

Changes to our operations have been necessary to accommodate the temporary structures. Creative thinking and hardworking staff have made this possible even with the ever-present mud!

We began to see the other side of the coin from the COVID demand – the falling adoption rates with people returning to work and taking advantage of their newfound freedom to travel. We have skyrocketing surrender requests pouring in from across the state and as far away as Sydney. The dogs we see now are tremendously under-socialised, with no basic training or manners.

We hope that some of this burden eases with the change of seasons and (hopefully) weather. Spring has traditionally brought an increase in adoptions; with luck, this year will not be different.

We said goodbye to long-term staff members, including the muchesteemed Shelter Manager of many years, Sally. Sally's absence will be felt keenly, and we are all very grateful for her many years of support, education and commitment to the cause. We wish her well for the future and hope she is very much aware of the role she has played within the department and in our lives.

In the meantime, we also welcomed new members into the fold -Behaviourist Georgia and new manager Vanessa. Hopefully, both have felt warmly welcomed, and we are eager to continue to grow with these new faces in the mix.

There are still many challenges ahead of us, but observing the progress of our new department contributes some light at the end of the tunnel.

Until then, we can only do our best to get through each day and the unique circumstances each seems to possess. Some will be harder than others, and where possible, we need to make sure we celebrate the successes we do encounter. Taking the time for a bit of laughter and fun, especially when it comes to doggy play dates, these do wonders for our mental health!

CATTERY

Oli Kelly started coming to Day Care in 2021 with the goal of building confidence.



VET CLINIC

This year alone, we have provided 12,791 consults, 1,788 desexing procedures, 616 dental procedures, 913 other surgical procedures, and 13,012 vaccinations and gained 1,011 new clients. Quite an accomplishment for the team!

The Animal Aid Veterinary team has once again proven their flexibility, determination and expertise in the face of difficult circumstances. The veterinary industry has been in a state of crisis with a lack of staffing. Many industry professionals chose to exit the industry and pursue other career opportunities - this has made hiring new vets and nurses an extremely challenging task to accomplish and has put a significant strain on those that remain within the industry. Whilst people are leaving the profession. The Animal Aid Veterinary Clinic has never been busier. Additionally, our team has seen an increase in staff illness and positive COVID cases. Despite this, our clinical team have continued to push through and adapt to changes as they appear each day.

We have seen an increase in more complex surgical cases. With such knowledgeable mentors in the clinic, training opportunities have presented themselves, increasing the skillset of the clinic as a whole.

We have some fantastic plans for continued education within the veterinary team, which will help us provide an even higher standard of care for our patients and the ability to take on even more non-routine procedures within the clinic.



Nicola was a three-month-old kitten transferred from our Bairnsdale Shelter to Coldstream with a swollen left hind leg on which she could not bear weight. In-house radiographs confirmed a fractured femur that was thought to have happened at a young age as there were already significant age changes and malunion with calcified callus.

Nicola was immediately admitted to our hospital and given some strong pain relief to keep her comfortable whilst the veterinary team discussed treatment options for her. Amputation of the leg was discussed at length due to the age and severity of the fracture – this choice would certainly be the easier option when compared to repairing such an advanced injury. However, in true Animal Aid Vet Clinic style, we picked the more complex option, which, if successful, would give Nicola every chance of living a

Dr. Nico, lead vet nurse Mel, and surgical

nurse Charlotte teamed up to perform this orthopaedic procedure using three pins to reunite and create stability in the fracture. The operation took two hours and was intricate due to tiny Nicola's size and how soft a young animal's bones are.

Kittens are often very resilient at that age, and Nicola proved that true. Upon recovery from her anaesthetic, Nicola was enthusiastically asking for food and cuddles.

After two months in foster with a strict physiotherapy plan, Dr. Nico medically cleared Nicola for adoption to her new home.

GROOMING

The past 12 months have been like none other! We are glad to say after an irregular couple of years, we are finally back into the swing of a predictable routine in the Animal Aid Grooming Salon!

We are continually grateful for our client's understanding with rescheduling due to staff shortages around mandatory quarantine. Scheduling has been disrupted at some points, with clients needing to reschedule and cancel appointments at the last minute.

In addition, we have had more young dogs presenting behavioural issues for grooming. Many have not been exposed to grooming, bathing, or even new people, an unfortunate consequence of COVID lockdowns early on in their lives. With pet's separation anxiety at a high, as they are not used to being apart from their owners, our team continue to work gently with these dogs. Taking it slowly and teaching the dogs what the grooming process is all about, it's lovely to see so many of these dogs improving in leaps and bounds with every groom. Our groomers aim to work with the owners to develop happy, settled dogs in the salon.

One of our greatest satisfactions as groomers is working with dogs and cats who have become overgrown, matted, and unkempt. Restoring them to a level of comfort is a gratifying job. This year we have worked with welfare to help several dogs with their coats before being adopted. It is always a heart-warming moment to see the freshly groomed dog happily walking out of the salon, tail wagging, free from discomfort!

This year we have noticed a substantial increase in the number of cats coming in for grooming and even guinea pigs!

It has been pleasing to see the rise in people's awareness of the need to groom cats and even pocket pets to keep them comfortable and free from matting. We have had many clients referred to us via social media by our current satisfied customers. It's always heartening to receive a referral from a happy client, which we genuinely appreciate.

This year we have welcomed many new clients and, sadly, have seen some exceptional long-term clients laid to rest. We have received quite a few beautiful letters and photographs from owners of these notable clients thanking us for our long-term care for their pets. In many cases, we have been seeing their pets every few weeks for years and consider them not only clients but also friends.

In the year ahead, we look forward to working with our valued volunteers to service our current clients and welcome many new clients.

EAST GIPPSLAND

The most significant accomplishment at Animal Aid East Gippsland over the last year was the success of our Animal Aid Welfare Grant Application from the Victorian Government. This grant enabled Animal Aid to design and construct a state-of-the-art outdoor feline enrichment area that is connected to our main free-roaming adoption cattery. This area has climbing structures, roof walkways, sitting boxes, large hamster wheels, and ample sitting space for the cats and visitors.

The feedback on this facility improvement has been 10 out of 10. The cats are happier being able to watch the world from a high vantage and see the sun. Happy cats mean better physical and mental health for the staff, volunteers and cats. Our community loves the relaxed environment of the cattery, which enables people to have an enjoyable experience at Animal Aid East Gippsland.

Thanks to a large donation from a generous family in our community, we have transformed the back room of the shelter from a dark storage space to a new dog/puppy post-operative and veterinary room. Four large veterinary pens, a veterinary table, new cupboards and a new split system were installed. This bright, quiet area enables

dogs or puppies to be housed whilst recovering from surgery instead of being housed in the busy mainstream kennels. This room is also designated for thorough veterinary dog/puppy examinations in a safe and quiet space.

This year has brought us an increasing number of cruelty and neglect cases in the cats/dogs admitted into our shelter. These animals are coming into our care not only with

behavioural issues, but their bodies are in horrendous condition requiring urgent veterinary treatment.

These cases keep staff and volunteers up at night in disbelief, tears and sadness. Our heartstrings are pulled; seeing animals in this state can be heartbreaking. The memory of their faces and the sounds of their cries are being replayed over and over again.

But we remind ourselves we can help them. Animal Aid has the resources to turn the outcome around. We can provide much-needed care at Animal Aid East Gippsland, at our welfare veterinary clinic, Coldstream, or our external vets at Main Street Veterinary Clinic.

Once treatment has been administered, and a veterinary/behavioural plan has been implemented, we are able to place this animal into our experienced foster care program to receive care in a home environment. These animals are monitored and vet-checked until they receive a veterinary clearance for adoption. When cleared for adoption and they go into their new loving homes, the most challenging moment turns into a moment of triumph.

All are happy to take kittens any time of the day or night and come back for more.

We have a steady flow of people looking for a new companion. Many are locals looking for that special one to add to the family. We work hard to be a friendly place where people feel comfortable to drop in and visit and ask for help or information on cat and dog care.

We work closely with the local doggy daycare, puppy school and dog obedience club to ensure that our new K9 families have all the resources they will ever need.



We have been incredibly lucky with the donations we have received over the 12 years we have been in the Wellington shire. From a bequest by the Mangan family that built our cat adoption building in 2019 to the fantastic portable off-lead dog yard, which has grown over the years from a 10m play area in 2013 to a 45mts in 2020. To the constant stream of people dropping off cat and dog food and bedding, to little kids who donate their birthday money. We are often stunned by the generosity of the locals.

Keeping engaged with the people of Gippsland will ensure we will always have the best staff, the best volunteers and foster families and loads of fabulous new adoption families beating a track to our door. It's a challenge we embrace daily and our most significant accomplishment

We hope to be out and about a bit in the coming year; we will be trying a few new events to spread the word about the terrific work our team does for the domestic pets for Gippsland.

The Mad Catter's Tea Party remains the perfect event to celebrate all things fabulously feline.


With scrumptious high tea delights, bottomless scones, and bubbly! With our 180 guests we raised \$7,500 and helped purrfect kittens find their forever homes.
